A hole was punched in the middle of them to prevent them being used outside the colony. The doughnut shaped coin was then stamped with the denomination of five shillings and the date of 1813.200 of the dollars were eventually melted down for bullion. Only about 300 are thought to survive, with about 200 of them privately owned.This example was sold in the UK in 2017 for 82,000, plus a buyers premium of 20 per cent. That brought the total price to 98,400, or about US \$115,000.But prices continued to rise steeply. In 2022, the Australian dealer Coinworks sold a fine example for AUS \$255,000. Thats about US \$360,000. 10. 1813 Dump Struck with A1/DiesThe partner to the 1813 Holy Dollar was the doughnut hole to the dollars doughnut. In other words, it was made from the silver cut out of the middle of the Spanish dollars. Its value is 15 pence, and it became known as a Dump.The most sought-after examples have an H on the reverse, between the words five and pence. The Type 9 was unusual in that the obverse side had the text (or legend) in a square.But all the kookaburra coins are known have quality issues. The surfaces are often rather dull, with inconsistent tones to the metal.This particular Type 9 specimen was special because of the quality of the strike. It was almost up to the standard of a proof, with crisp detailing on both sides. And the toning on both sides was superior to other examples too, with a warm golden tone on the obverse. It was sold in 2018 by the dealers Coinworks for a price of AUS \$135,000. 4. 1852 Type I Adelaide PoundAdelaide pounds were the very first Australian gold coins. That alone makes them precious and collectable. But the Type I Adelaide pounds are more collectable still. In this type, a flaw in the die resulted in a crack that ran through the letters D W T on one side of the coin. Only 40 such coins are known to have been produced. And of those, just three were uncirculated, leaving them in pristine condition. This is one of those coins, and for many years it was owned by the American coin collector Mortimer Hammet. It came up for sale in August 2021, offered through the dealers Coinworks. It was quickly snapped up for AUS \$600,000. That's about US \$410,000. 5. 1953 Proof Perth PennyThe Perth Mint first began striking coins in 1899. At that time, it was a branch of the London Mint, and its first tasks were to create Australian sovereigns and half sovereigns.Making proof coins was a resource intensive process in the 1950s. Only around 20 proofs were typically produced. 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up to AUS \$6,000.It was over 30 years before it was offered for sale in 2021. The first year run for the \$2 coin (as designed by acclaimed sculptor Horst Hahne) bears the initials of the man himself, HH printed on the bottom left. This was later removed from 1990 onwards. The Aboriginal man on the coin itself is said to be a Warlpiri-Amnatyerre Ioreman from the Northern Territory, Tjungurrayi, who was believed to have been born around 1895 in the Tanami Desert, north-west of Alice Springs. According to SBS he was a survivor of the Coniston Massacre that took place in 1928. While this coin has been listed at \$10,000, it is indeed only worth around \$10 in good condition because around 160 million were minted.
