Think of someone whose head is "high in the clouds" and looks down on everyone around them. That is haughty. Haughty is used to describe someone who is both arrogant (elitist, pompous, looks down on people) and condescending (talks down to people). The related noun haughtiness refers to strong pride or arrogance. Usage Examples: She met his humble question with a haughty reply and a disdainful toss of her hair. (arrogant, vain) Their haughtiness is off-putting and some of their old friends avoid their self-absorbed, critical, and condescending conversations. (arrogance) noun Ever since she married a wealthy man, she has become haughty and seems to look down on and talk condescendingly to her old friends. "Haughty" underscores the idea of an overbearing and haughty demeanor, which can hinder effective communication and harmonious interactions with others.1. Over time, this notion of being 'high' in a literal sense evolved metaphorically to signify superiority or arrogance. As 'haughty' entered the English language, it retained this sense of lofty pride and an attitude of superiority towards others. Thus, when describing someone as 'haughty,' it conveys their demeanor as excessively proud, aloof, and disdainful, as if they are looking down from a lofty perch upon those they consider beneath them.1.
